

Just about every newspaper has a Web site today giving you varying amounts of access to current and very recent issues. Usually, for a price, you can get more access, sometimes in full-text. But what if you want older issues for free? Here are some ways to do that.

Nine from



As state employees, you may be aware that the State Library gives you access to nine of Ohio's larger newspapers, some dating back to the mid 1980s. They are text-only and just include local and state content without the ads.

To get to these papers, start with the State Employees Resources page on our website at <http://library.ohio.gov/Marketing/StateEmps>. Click on **Ohio Newspapers** under **Electronic Reference Resources**. You will be asked to give your name (last/first) and number (last nine digits on your State Library card). Then click on **Ohio** at the bottom of the newspaper list – this will show all nine.

By clicking on each newspaper name, you will see what is meant by "current". Only two of the nine will have today's content. Some are a few weeks behind. It is therefore better to search each one individually rather than as a group.

Ohio Papers in Chronicling America

Chronicling America (<http://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov>) is a project of the Library of Congress and the National Endowment for the Humanities. Its purpose

is to digitize older issues of newspapers from across America and make them available online at no cost as searchable images. While its target date range is 1836-1922, the current coverage begins in 1860.

To see the Ohio papers that are currently included, go to our website's **Digital & Special Collections** page (<http://library.ohio.gov/PCS/digitalcontent>). Clicking on each title will take you to a calendar for each year, with the dates that are included shown as links. Click on a date link and then on each newspaper page to enlarge it. A zoom tool allows you to enlarge an area of the page to make it readable and printable.


The Ohio Historical Society Collection



The Ohio Historical Society has a **very** large collection of older editions of Ohio newspapers. Some of them are hard copy only, but many of them have been microfilmed and can be borrowed through interlibrary loan.

To see what is in this collection, go to <http://www.ohiohistory.org/portal/archiveslibrary-p.html>. On this search screen, just put the name of the city or county in **Newspaper Keyword** box. Further down on the page, you can limit your search to hard copy or microfilm.


If you cannot make it to the Ohio Historical Society during their limited hours (Thu 10-7, Fri 10-5, Sat 10-5), a lot of the filmed papers can be borrowed through interlibrary loan (ILL) using your local public library. Make note of the roll number that covers the date(s) that you want. There is a small fee for the ILL service.





